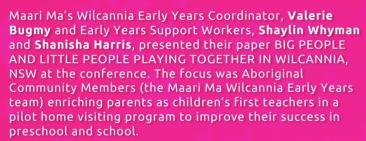

NATIONAL CONFERENCE PRESENTATION

Maari Ma's Wilcannia playgroup team delivered a paper at a national conference, 1200 delegates attended the SNAICC – National Aboriginal & Islander Child Care - National Conference which was held in September in Adelaide.



It's a great achievement for the Wilcannia Playgroup team - it's no easy task to stand in front of so many people. The conference was convened to assist with the achievement of the SNAICC vision: An Australian society in which our communities are empowered to determine their own future: where the rights of our children, young people and families are protected; where our cultural identity and achievements are valued; and our children and families have access to culturally appropriate services. Maari Ma Wilcannia playgroup team addressed delegates from around the country and from overseas at the 8th SNAICC National Conference in September in Adelaide.

The conference discussed challenges and shared knowledge and experiences in raising happy, healthy and confident children in communities.

As well as providing a powerful and inspiring learning experience for all attendees it also provided opportunities to meet and experience some of the richness and culture of the local communities of South Australia. There were international, state and local keynote speakers, more than 70 concurrent sessions, yarning circles, panels and workshops; displays, poster presentations and exhibitors; cultural highlights and



performances; and social events and opportunities to network and connect with peers. It was the largest conference of its type in the southern hemisphere for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander organisations, policy makers, researchers, government representatives, other non-government organisations and industry representatives to gather and make renewed commitments to Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander children.

momentous occasion. Maari
Ma are proud that three of the
Wings program children, local
dancers, and our Strong Young
Families workers were part of
the event when it came to the
region.

The corroboree was a week long festival that started in Walgett on the 28th September, then went to Brewarrina, Bourke, Wilcannia and Menindee. Its aim was to highlight the plight of the Darling River to the nation. The Wilcannia Dance Group, Menindee Dance Group and the Tal-Kin-Jeri Dance Group from Adelaide performed under the stars near the Burke and Wills campground at Menindee on the 2nd October with around 300 watching the historic event. A similar number attended the corroboree the night before at Wilcannia on the banks of the Darling River.

The festival provided a focus for First Nations communities to have a voice and celebrate culture with family and friends, and the organisers said they were prompted to do something big to highlight the plight of the river system after the mass fish deaths at Menindee last year. They said they hoped the rolling event along the Darling would empower communities and put pressure on governments to assist the river towns.

HEALING PROGRAM HIGHLIGHTED

Well done to **Marsha Files** and Maari Ma's Healing program team on the recent inclusion of the program in the NSW Government's second edition of the Domestic Violence Regional Strategy Groups (RSGs) quarterly newsletter.

The Healing Program team headed the snapshots of the region section and provided a good comprehensive run-down of the program. Other projects highlighted were South West Sydney DV events, Newcastle youth program, Inverell community framework, Wollongong youth project and Blacktown courageous conversations. Deputy Secretary of the RSGs, Simone Walker, said the RSGs play an important part in implementation, leading projects and addressing issues in the regions in order to protect victims and hold perpetrators to account. She said in June 2019 the Premier recommitted to reducing domestic violence reoffending as a Premier's Priority, with a target of a 25% reduction in the number of domestic violence reoffenders by 2023.

HEALING PROGRAM SUPPORTS GENERATIONAL CHANGE IN FAR WEST NSW

Maari Ma Health have delivered their healing program to over 200 people in Far West NSW as part of a 2 year trial that is nearing completion.

Kalypi Paaka Mirika: Clear River Ahead Healing Program enables participants over 6 weeks to understand their circumstances and deal with stressors that may lead to violence. It will contribute to an evidence base for healing programs and received funding support from the

Marsha Files from Maari Ma co-designed and trained workers for the Kalypi Paaka Mirika: Clear River Ahead Healing Program.

NSW Domestic and Family Violence Innovation Fund and the National Healing Foundation.

The program targets prevention and early intervention by introducing theraputic practices and skills within a localised cultural framework which highlights the strength of Aboriginal culture. The program develops knowledge and skills around change, culture, goal setting, violence, stress, trauma, resilience, loss, grief and managing grief.

A strength of the program is that it was designed and delivered by and for the Aboriginal communities of Broken Hill, Wilcannia and Menindee utilising local research developed with the University of NSW for the Community Safety Research Project.

Youth Work Awards & Conference



Maari Ma was again nominated this year in the NSW Youth Work Awards 2019, this time in the category Outstanding Use of Data and was one of four nominees.

While not a winner (the winner in this category was WAGS the Dog Program) it was great to get recognition at the event held in Sydney which celebrates youth workers from across the state.

NSW YOUTH WORK AWARDS 2019

The awards were part of a conference which aims to build and strengthen youth work practice, inspire attendees with innovative ideas, and connect them with others across the state. Wings Coordinator, **Tania Lawson** and Early Years Support Project Officer, **Lee-Ann Adams** attended the conference and awards night and said it was a very valuable experience. Tania said she took a lot of information and messages home with her and Lee-Ann said the two day conference was fantastic and an eye-opener. She said there was an Indigenous youth panel that told their stories of homelessness and how they got to where they are today. She said while it was heartbreaking it was also very inspiring.
