NEW YEARS RESOLUTION:

Quit Smoking!

The Kiila Laana team understand the efforts made by every pledger to continue to pave a path towards a smoke-free future, so in December the team gladly meet with the current participants and presented a \$250 grocery voucher to each pledger for continuing to engage with the program and making small but important steps in reducing their tobacco intake.



The vouchers were from the kiilalaana program, an incentive to inspire participants to stay focused on the end goal of being tobacco-free. Kiilalaana's media Project Officer **Sharon Hooker**, said the gathering was relaxed and offered an opportunity for community members thinking of quitting to come along, meet the team and talk to others who have joined the program. Sharon said it was important to provide an activity as well, such as homemade body products using easily accessible ingredients such as Honey, Coconut Oil, and Sugars. This provided a relaxed atmosphere which resulted in a lot of laughs and interesting body product results, and also allowed pledgers to openly discuss any struggles or questions about their smoke-free journey.

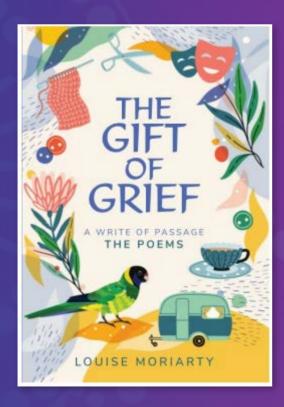












Helping the Grieving Process
